About the AP® English Literature and Composition Summer Institute

Welcome to the AP® English Literature and Composition session at UGA! Participants can expect a thorough review of the course content by units and organization methods with emphasis on progression of skills and pacing. In addition, a large portion of the course will be dedicated to each genre of the course - short story, poetry, and long fiction/drama - including multiple text examples, instructional strategies and activities, exam preparation for each genre, and ideas on using AP Classroom to reinforce and enhance instruction. Ample time will also be devoted to a thorough review of the exam expectations, exam strategies, and opportunities for scoring samples and calibrating to each of the rubrics. This course will also include sessions creating equitable classes for all types of students, cultivating readers and writers for life, and keeping our teacher selves from burning out. Whether new and designing a class from the ground up or a veteran teacher who is refreshing and reimagining their course, session members will have time and space to create and apply materials to their own courses, grow in their own competence and confidence, and learn from and encourage other course members. The ultimate goal is for all to have the knowledge and skills to design courses that are enjoyable and successful for both students and the instructor. Let the learning fun begin! (and Go Dawgs!)

- Review FRQ2 Rubric, Prompt, Samples, Chief Reader and Instructional Reports, and practice scoring

Day 3 - Poetry

Objectives:

- Understand the foundational principles of reading and writing about poetry
- Explore and share strategies for teaching poetry
- Plan for Poetry Skill Progression (Units 2, 5, and 8)
- Discuss strategies for choosing evidence and developing commentary
- Review FRQ1 Rubric, Prompt, Samples, Chief Reader and Instructional Reports, and practice scoring

Bonus: Handling the Paper Load

Day 4 - Long Fiction/Drama

Objectives

- Understand the foundational principles of reading and writing about long fiction/drama
- Explore and share strategies for teaching longer texts
- Plan for Long Fiction Skill Progression (Units 3, 6, and 9)
- Discuss strategies to teach sophisticated writing
- Review FRQ3 Rubric, Prompt, Samples, Chief Reader and Instructional Reports, and practice scoring
